CONTENTS

The course aims to make students aware of sustainability and social inclusion when we build up communities. The students will be equipped to address global issues like sustainability, environmental issues and social equity. The topics given will explore with the idea of reciprocal relationship between environment and society and it also deals with different ideologies and perspectives of Environmental Sociology and sustainability and gendered experiences.

The Teaching Activities introduce the concept of sustainable development and social inclusion in a South Asian Perspective. Here students examine case studies related to people's participation and socio-cultural perspective in sustainable development. It also covers different methodological approaches such as environmental impact assessments, participatory planning and integrated policy frameworks also. These topics would help the students to compare and critically evaluate current policies and can how sustainability is promoted in different socio-cultural contexts.

Also, through this course the students will understand how women experience environmental impacts differently particularly in Indian contexts; for instance, women spent hours for collecting water and firewood for household needs in rural areas. These gendered experiences offer new insight into environmental degradation and related issues. This involves how societal norms and women's role in decision making influence accessibility and decision-making. The course also deals with how gender sensitive policies can promote equality and environmental sustainability.

This series of lectures aim to improve students understanding of the principles, strategies involving



the communities that are sustainable, inclusive, resilient and equitable. Students will understand how far the community led initiatives ensure the social equity and inclusion through different programs in different socio cultural contexts.

The objectives of the series of lectures are given herewith:

- To make the students aware of the concepts related to sustainability and social inclusion
- To examine and analyse the challenges and possibilities of communities in achieving sustainable development
- To learn different strategies adopted by communities in a South Asian perspective
- To critically evaluate policies, programs, and initiatives aimed at community sustainability.
